16 17 18 19	WHEREAS, in recent years, recruitment challenges for nursing aides, in particular Certified Nursing Assistants (CNAs), has resulted in staffing shortages at Samaritan Campus, which has about twenty nursing aide vacancies; and
20 21 22	WHEREAS, the State has implemented Fast Forward and other grants in an attempt to spur the number of people entering nursing aide training programs; and
23 24 25 26	WHEREAS, future registered nurses are required to obtain a Certified Nursing Assistant (CNA) certificate, yet are not required to work in the role more than 8 hours per year to keep their certification; and
27 28 29 30	WHEREAS, Wisconsin Congressman Sean Duffy recently introduced the "Nursing Home Workforce Quality Act," which, among other reforms, would limit lockouts of nursing home directed CNA training courses;
31 32 33 34 35	<b>NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED</b> that the Washington County Board of Supervisors requests the State of Wisconsin adopt the federal requirement that a nurse aide training and competency evaluation program consist of no less than seventy-five (75) clock hours of training.
36 37 38 39	<b>BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED</b> that the Washington County Board of Supervisors supports the intent of the Nursing Home Workforce Quality act and requests the State of Wisconsin do the same.

Re: Nursing Aide Advisory Resolution

## **POLICY QUESTION:**

Should the Human Services Committee recommend the County Board pass an advisory resolution to federalize nursing aid training programs and limit federal lockouts of training programs?

#### **DISCUSSION:**

Last legislative session, Assembly Bill 432 failed to pass the State Senate. The bill would have eliminated Wisconsin's 120 classroom hours for certified nursing assistants (CNAs). Federal regulations and neighboring states require 45 fewer hours. The goal of the legislation is to ensure quality CNA candidates quickly enter the pipeline and are on the nursing floor weeks sooner.

Because many regulations for skilled nursing facilities are written and enforced by the Federal Centers for Medicare and Medicaid, using the federal standard makes sense.

Wisconsin faces a shortfall of qualified CNA and other nursing aides. The Samaritan Campus has approximately twenty openings for nursing aides. Passing this resolution will allow Washington County and Samaritan Campus to tell our story to the legislators who will be attempting to adequately address the concerns in the next state budget.

The resolution also supports Northern Wisconsin Congressman Sean Duffy's legislation to limit CNA training lockouts for nursing homes with training programs. While Samaritan Campus does not currently train CNA's, area nursing homes do. Samaritan could partner with these nursing homes or eventually train themselves. Lockouts prevent training programs, particularly in rural areas, from being taught at a locked-out nursing home. Expanding opportunities increases the number of CNA's in the Wisconsin pipeline.
