LACK OF AFFORDABLE CHILDCARE



- Teacher shortages
- Lack of support for classroom management
- Slim operating margins



Waiting lists are primarily due to:

- Wages
- Benefits
- Costly training

CHILDCARE CAPACITY IN SHEBOYGAN COUNTY

• 21 licensed group and 20 home-based childcare providers serving ~ 1,550 children

- ~ 100 babies are born in Sheboygan County each month
- There are nearly 400 children on waiting lists
 - 40 additional teachers are needed for all current providers to operate at full capacity



ADDING CHILDCARE AT **ROCKY KNOLL**

- ~\$120,000 to renovate existing space
- licensing regulations
- Additional benefits:
 - Intergenerational programming
 - Employee recruitment and retention

Adherence to both childcare <u>and</u> nursing home



CONTRACTED SERVICE

- Growing Generations Child Care Center
- Added over 20 childcare spots

INTERGENERATIONAL PROGRAMMING

- Weekly activities
- Residents read them stories and watch them play outside
- Enhanced quality of life

AMERICAN RESCUE PLAN ACT (ARPA) Childcare Taskforce

ARPA CHILDCARE TASKFORCE

June 2022

August 2021

- Taskforce established
- <u>19 cross-sector members, met regularly for 6 months</u>
- Charge: Develop a report with recommended strategies to provide more childcare options in Sheboygan County
- County Board approved five recommendations Allocated \$2 million to two local nonprofit organizations

FAMILY CONNECTIONS

ARPA Allocation: \$1,815,000

Program Goals

- Hire 2 recruitment specialists to increase childcare staff by 40 (thus increasing childcare slots by 110)
- Hire 2 inclusion specialist to support 50 cases of challenging behavior (thus reducing burnout of providers and reducing expulsion rates)
- Provide free or reduced cost entry-level courses
- Provide sign-on and retention bonuses
- Provide start-up and expansion grants to providers to cover expenses

such as licensing fees, background checks, furniture and learning supplies

- Hired 2 recruitment specialists
- Hired 2 inclusion specialists
 - Provided services to 17 facilities, supporting 37 teachers and 49 children
 - Zero expulsions of children receiving services
- Provided 225 free or reduced cost entry-level courses
- Provided 1,876 bonuses totaling \$435,347
- Provided 8 start-up grants, totaling \$36,150, creating 32 childcare slots
- Provided 6 expansion grants, totaling \$79,155, creating 116 childcare slots



BOYS & GIRLS CLUB

ARPA Allocation: \$185,000

Program Goals

- Expand services by hiring new staff
- Serve 200 additional children annually

Impact Thus Far

- Removed financial barriers by reducing or waiving fees for low-income families
- Minimized or eliminated waitlists for programs
- Eliminated specific drop-off/pick-up times to allow greater flexibility for parents/guardians
- Hired additional staff and increased wages for direct service staff to support recruitment and retention
- Served 796 youth through June (780 throughout all of 2023)
- Enrolled 535 youth in summer programs (332 last year)

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Childcare in Wisconsin is expensive.

- The average annual cost of infant care in ٠
- . per month.
- . the District of Columbia for most expensive infant care

Wisconsin is \$12,567—that's \$1,047 per month. Childcare for a 4-year-old costs \$10,197, or \$850

Wisconsin is ranked 20th out of 50 states and

Childcare is one of the biggest expenses families face.

Infant care in Wisconsin costs \$4,092 (48.3%) more per year than in-state tuition for a fouryear public college. That makes Wisconsin one of 33 states and DC where infant care is more expensive than college. In Wisconsin, infant care costs 20.5% more than average rent.

Childcare is unaffordable for most families in Wisconsin.



Infant care for one child would take up 18.5% of a median family's income in Wisconsin.

 According to the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS), childcare is affordable if it costs no more than 7% of a family's income. By this measure, only
6.5% of Wisconsin families can afford infant care.

Families With two children face an even greater burden.



Childcare for two children—an infant and a 4year-old costs \$22,764. That's 56.1% more than average rent in Wisconsin. A typical family in Wisconsin would have to spend 33.6% of its income on childcare for an infant and a 4-year-old.

Childcare is out of reach for lowwage workers.

A minimum wage worker in Wisconsin would need to work full time for 43 weeks, or from January to October, just to pay for childcare

How tough is it to find childcare and affordable housing in Dodge County?



A childcare desert is any census tract with more than 50 children under age 5 that contains either no childcare providers or so î۰, few options that there are more than three times as many children as licensed childcare slots.

Ō Average waiting list for the DCHA 208 owned units is over 150, with average wait times of one year. Turn over varies by location.

Average wait list of HCV program is 1,000, with average wait time more than a year.

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
Largest sought-after unit/voucher is for three-bedroom units



Because DCHA had so many families looking for, and not finding, three-bedroom units- in 2018 the DCHA built 20 duplex units in Horicon and are following that up with the 40 units in Juneau and Reeseville




To make these new units more affordable they have filled the roofs with solar electric panels which offset about \$65 in monthly electric cost.

Dodge County Housing Authority (DCHA) Housing Operations

The only Public Housing Authority in Dodge County since 1972

Own and operate 208 units in eleven communities

Neighborhood Investment Grant

188 of our units are funded by USDA Rural Development

Additional property under development - a planned childcare center and another 40 new units of affordable - workforce housing a childcare center for 45 children in Reeseville

10 units of duplex homes in Reeseville (no LIHTC)

- Administer the HUD Housing Choice Voucher Program 157 vouchers
- Layered programs vary by location including Rural Development, HUD, LIHTC, WHEDA, HOME, Housing Trust Funds, FHLB AHP Grant, DOA
- 20 units are Tax Credit units with WHEDA financing 20 duplex homes

 - 30 Units of Tax Credit duplex homes in Juneau





Horicon Details:

- housing:
 - 52 children under the age of 18
 - 19 new enrollees in the Horicon public school district of 680
 - 90% (18) of the resident families were living in unstable housing, with another family, or. in a 2-bedroom unit prior to moving to their new home
 - 4 households included a disabled child
 - 6 households included a disabled adult
 - 9 households experienced a decrease in income due to COVID
- Partnered with Moraine Park Technical College and Dodge County - UW Extension to provide access to educational opportunities
- Partnered with Central Wisconsin Community Action Council and Dodge County
- \$23,250.








Housing Development in Juneau, WI

- 1,150 sq, ft. three bedroom, 1.5 baths, garages, many with basements, all with solar systems and most close to schools.
- Juneau will have 60% CMI maximum incomes.
- Juneau homes built to be "Certified" family childcare operations thus all will be eligible for "Wisconsin Shares" funds.

Childcare Development in **Reeseville**/ Lowell

Reeseville/Lowell will have no income limits to better serve the "workforce" folks.

- The Greater Watertown Community Health Foundation will offer training for family childcare operators, and lowcost funding support.
- Because it will have no first mortgage, the Reeseville/Lowell childcare center will offer lower cost childcare and higher wages.
- Business Partner will employ childcare center workers.
- The building will be "rent free" to the childcare operator.


