Wisconsin Population

- Slow growth; decline in this decade?
- Aging
 - > 2040, 75+ pop 80% greater than in 2020
- Number of children declining
 - Under 15; down 41K 2010-20; down 49K 2020-23
- Retirees moving north



Wisconsin Workforce

- Shrinking; likely to continue
- Participation down in some ages
 - > 35-44 down 4.7 points
 - > 55+ down 2.3 points
- Rural labor force continues to erode




Wisconsin Economy

- Job openings at record levels
 - > 5% openings rate
 - 100 unemployed for every 200 openings
- Wages rising
 - Growing much faster at the bottom
 - > '19-23; 30% at the bottom vs. 15% at the top



75+ Population to Surge


Population change by decade





Total Beds Actual and Projected Need




Elder Care Workforce 2023

RNs, CNAs, and home health/personal care aids






Wisconsin Labor Force Stalling






Prime Working Age Population Falling





Population Moving North?










Participation varies widely (Ifpr 2023); South Central strongest


LFPR 2023 State Avg. 66.1%
